About our work | The rights of indigenous peoples are a paramount justice issue for many truth commissions, past, current and emerging. Indigenous communities are targeted by violence in ways that are distinct from the rest of society. Yet, in most legal systems, these experiences are marginalized or inadequately addressed. There are numerous commissions emergent on the horizon that will investigate the legacies of human rights violations in contexts where indigenous people are specifically targets of atrocity.

Conference Objectives | The goal of our work on this issue is to begin identifying what guiding principles can help ensure the truth commissions support the strengthening of an indigenous rights regime. The conference will approach the topics as both normative and operational concerns for truth commissions. As a practical question, we aim to begin identifying proper procedures for commissions to effectively document and convey the experiences of indigenous peoples. As a normative question, we hope this conference will be the first step towards developing guiding principles for truth commission to better address the distinct needs of indigenous peoples and support their rights.
